We want Christmas now. Advent invites us to develop patience, to learn the power of hope, and the joy of expectation.


Advent is not merely preparation for remembering the occurrence of Jesus' birth 2000 years ago. Advent points us to the hope of Christ coming again - every day.

Listen, God is calling. Listen, Christ is coming. Listen, someone needs your love.


Jesus is born in our listening. Above all things may we put on love, which holds all things together.

The Chicago Avenue Fire Arts Center (CAFAC) has been asked to create a large-scale public art piece reflective of three stakeholders in the Calvary Community: the Calvary Congregation, Calvary Food Shelf, and Urban Arts Academy. site worship service and were set up in the courtyard. They received input from the people who visited with them about how the new artwork might reflect values these people felt were important.
